



Philip E. Stearns

June 13, 1945 - September 2, 2007

Philip E. Stearns, 62, of West Hartford, died Sunday, September 2, 2007. Cherished retired teacher of English at Manchester High for 35 years, he retained his zest for life until the last moment. In addition to longtime partner Stephen L. Purdy, he leaves broken-hearted numerous close friends, colleagues and legions of former students in whose lives he continued to participate. Also surviving, his dear cousin Carol Lehman of Louisville, Kentucky. Phil was predeceased by his parents, Eleanor Bell Stearns and Clarence E. Stearns, whose joy and engaging minds could only have created our Phil. Full of life and words from the start, his boyhood in upstate New York included writing a "Teen Scene" column for the Rochester Democrat and Chronicle, participation in the high school debate team, and attendance at area college programs. At 16, he drew on an American Field Service scholarship to spend a summer with a native family on the Greek Island of Crete. As an undergraduate at Colby College in Maine, his passion for learning involved continued debate and study during his junior year at Exeter and Cambridge Universities in England. In the spirit Phil had always worked to help finance his education, graduate study at The University of Wisconsin Madison included six months of teaching in a secondary school - predictably, he chose inner-city Beloit. Indeed, while subsequently tapped for professorship by prestigious universities, he answered his calling to public secondary education in the diverse and evolving community of Manchester. In jumping in full-steam, he tapped literature and theater, community and politics,

to help each of his students find an inner spark and self-esteem. He is most remembered for his stewardship of students to The Hartford Stage ?the big city? and a decades-long leadership of the school?s Junior Honors English Independent Study Project. With an unlimited scope for the latter, its key criteria remained honest research and respect for others? points of view. Subjects ranged from the likes of Long Wharf Theater to a Broadway choreographer to Holocaust survivors, and the program helped many young people proceed to esteemed higher education, honors, and to strongly successful personal and professional lives. Phil?s other mentoring at Manchester High included presence on the school?s chapter of AFS, and repeated guidance to students during summer trips to Europe. His unwavering commitment to legitimate ideas and social justice often translated into support for colleagues ?up against the system.? Those who knew Phil and Stephen saw their art- and music-filled home as a refuge for conversation and solitude, books and food ? and cats. We would like to thank the many hearts and hands of Vitas Hospice of East Hartford, and suggest that any memorial contributions be sent either to them, the Helen and Harry Gray Cancer Center at Hartford Hospital, or a Democratic candidate of your choice. 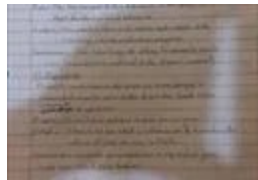

“ Sum up Phil in 1000 characters? Phil WAS 1000 characters. As a high school kid in the early 1970s, Phil's sparkling intelligence, zany humor, and incredible passion for the arts drew me to him like a magnet.

Soon I went out of my way to hang out with him, and I drew many other kids into Phil's orbit. He became a hero; we discussed him and his antics constantly. We affectionately teased Phil about being Phil, and he loved it. Phil was my light and star during my time at MHS, no one stands as a remote second.

After graduation we became close friends, Phil took me to England and NYC several times. He'd done everything, so he was only interested in doing whatever I wanted to do. He miraculously got us last second Broadway tickets to *Equus* in NYC the night Richard Burton premiered. We got there late, the play was about to start and why wasn't Phil handing me a ticket? Why was he dawdling? Because he realized the tickets were not together, and he was meticulously scrutinizing them to make sure I'd get the better seat 10th row!.

Every moment with Phil seemed to offer another intellectual revelation, except for the many times of gut-busting laughter; I cannot forget how his face would turn red. He seemed to know something about everything; so much so that I was startled when I presented him with questions he could not address. I can't begin to explain how much I learned from this man about art, film, literature, music, and life in general; for me he was almost like a private tutor. He always took tremendous, caring interest in me and my development as a person and a scholar.

Life, jobs, and marriage took me away from Phil, as well as many others, and I did not see him for many, many years. I kept thinking, "I'll look him up next year, no rush." Now he is gone. I hope someone learns from this sad lesson.

Now I teach and I more or less write for a living--thanks in no small measure to Phil--but words fail me. In our lifetimes, if we are lucky, we will meet just a handful of truly amazing human beings. For me, Phil was one. The loss of Phil is devastating, but I know that he will live in my heart forever, as he will for countless others whose lives he touched, whose lives he shaped. “*Mr. Stearns was my teacher for both English Composition and English Literature in 1975. Thirty-two years later, I still remember many of his assignments and his gift for teaching.*

On the first day of composition class, he asked us to write instructions for making a peanut butter and jelly sandwich. The next day, he came to class armed with peanut butter, jelly, a huge loaf of bread and a knife. The class was in hysterics as he followed our instructions "precisely," squashing one sandwich on the floor with his shoe. He also had us write our autobiographies, and I still have a tattered copy, with his many thoughtful and humorous comments in the margins.

He introduced us to literary and film works not part of the usual curriculum -- we read Maugham's "the Razor's Edge," watched Bergman's "the Seventh Seal," thank goodness he was able to explain its meaning to us! and Audrey Hepburn and Albert Finney in "Two for the Road."

His enthusiasm, love of literature and the arts and fondness for his students will always be remembered. I hope you find comfort in knowing of the many lives he has touched. “ *The first time I met Phil was in the summer when he moved from Madison, Wisconsin to Manchester to take up his teaching position at Manchester High School. I was struck then by the intelligence and energy level he brought to the task, and he never lost that dedication and giving of himself through all his years of teaching.*

I was a fellow teacher and also a Dept. Chair with Phil, and he was a top member of the department. I have many memories of laughter and heated discussions over politics, the time when we picketed the state capital and Camp Hartel when the Bridgeport teachers were imprisoned for striking, the hours of writing curriculum and discussing how many angels could really tap dance on the head of a pin, and especially the nuances of a Broadway play or the Hartford Stage's latest.
